Balanced Budget and Increased Equalized Land Valuation

This fall the Cambria-Friesland Board of Education approved a total school levy of \$2,558,346.00, for the 2019-2020 school year. The levy resulted in a mill rate of \$12.16. This rate was based upon a student enrollment of 385 and equalized land valuation of \$210,444,824.00. In comparison to the 2018-2019 budget was supported by a mill rate of \$12.68 and an equalized land valuation of \$208,975,923.00. In contrast to our neighboring school districts we can see the impact equalized land valuation has on the mill rate. This inverse relationship demonstrates how the state of Wisconsin applies equalized land valuation to district property taxes in order to support public education and the private school voucher programs. Please note, the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program, Racine Parental Choice Program, and Special Needs Scholarship Programs received \$49,735.00 from the Cambria-Friesland School communities to support private and parochial education throughout the state.

OPPORTUNITIES AND PLANS



Things like semester exams and the upcoming ACT Statewide Exam are opportunities not only to demonstrate knowledge but the right grades and the right scores can open doors. Did you know that scoring 17 or higher on the ACT Math will mean you don't have to take remedial courses at a Tech School? Did you know you may need a 24 or higher on ACT Math to qualify for credit bearing courses at a four year college?



And it's not just college. A high enough ACT Math score can exempt you from taking math courses and exams that others have to complete as part of an apprenticeship.

January is also the beginning of the course planning process. Eighth through eleventh grade students will be planning courses for next year. It's important to plan for classes that will prepare you to take advantage of opportunities and sometimes that means taking more difficult classes. It also means sticking with those challenging courses when the going gets tough. Quitting when things are difficult decreases your opportunities and your choices. So, get help when you need it, but don't back away from challenges and you may be amazed at what it can lead to!

Handbook Highlights

This month's Handbook Highlight is about schedule changes.

Schedule Changes

The general rule is that students are not to request changes in their schedules once the scheduling process has been completed. If a student or parent believes a change in a schedule is necessary, they are to contact the counselor as soon as possible to discuss the schedule change request. If the request is based on post-high school plans, the request may be granted. Once the school counselor believes the request is reasonable, it must then be approved by the principal. No schedule requests will be granted after the first week of the new school semester.

While schedules are already set for second semester, there are times when students are looking to make a change and the semester is the time it is possible. However, there are deadlines and parameters. Some classes are full and can not have additional students. Please contact Ms. Borman as soon as possible regarding any potential requests. This year, the deadline for processing a request will be January 27. In order to be completed by January 27, they must be started before that day.

Responsibility in 2020

It is truly remarkable how much our children listen to us. I would bet children listen to us at least 80% of the time. By now you probably think I'm crazy and are wondering what planet I am from but hear me out. While it is easy to tell if a child is listening to what we say or ask of them, it is a little more nuanced to observe how they model us. A quote from American Novelist/Essayist/Playwright James Baldwin reads, "*Children have never been very good at listening to their elders, but they have never failed to imitate them.*" It doesn't take much to stop and see all the little "adult" things our children like to do or let you know they are capable of. So what does this have to do with raising responsible children? Take this scenario, you are running late and your child is trying to put their shoes on and you tell them, "We're late and don't have time for this" and you proceed to change their shoes for them. What has just been communicated to the child? *You are not capable of putting your own shoes on.* Now, repeat this over the course of a day and there may be a dozen, two dozen, or more instances where we tell our children we've got this and most of the time the message being sent is, "*You can't do this*". Now, what's a parent to do? We say things like "We can't be late again" "We don't have time for this" and "It will be less of a hassle if I do it myself". We are not telling our children that they cannot do things on their own, but we often are showing them that they can't. So, this holiday season, give being late a try if it means your child can practice getting themselves ready with your help, give them a job when preparing meals, have them clean up their toys before they move on to another project. Removing the opportunity for children to build accountability and responsibility is probably not worth those extra three minutes.



GREEN BAY PACKERS HIGH SCHOOL QB CHALLENGE AT LAMBEAU FIELD CAMBRIA-FRIESLAND WAS INVITED!!



Designed to highlight high school quarterbacks and their receivers, the Quarterback Challenge is a competition between two high schools to showcase their passing and ball catching abilities on Lambeau Field.

How the halftime competition is run...

- Both teams are lined up at the 20 yard line.
- The first school is announced and the QB throws as far as possible in efforts to complete a pass to his receiver. If a completion is made, Packers staff will mark the location of the completion with a cone. If the pass is dropped, no mark is made.
- The second high school is announced and QB follows the same format as the first team.
- Each team gets two tries (one pass to each receiver). The team that completes the longest pass is crowned the winner of the QB Challenge (Passing yards are not added between the two throws – it's the longest single catch)

Representing CF were QB Kobe Smit and Receivers Mason Owen and Cade Burmania. Players received game tickets and sideline passes from the Packers. They were introduced to a cheering crowd of 77,296 fans at half time, their pictures appeared on the jumbotron while being introduced.

Kobe completed both passes he threw, one each to Cade and Mason.

CF was well represented as family members and many CF alum were in attendance.

Technology Just Went 3D

The Business & Technology Business Education Department will soon be heading into another facet of technological equipment.

Thanks to DonorsChoose.org, Ms. Arnce has secured a 3D printer and supplies for students to use in the Technology Department.

What is 3D Printing? 3D printing or additive manufacturing is a process of making three dimensional solid objects from a digital file. The creation of a 3D printed object is achieved using additive processes. 3D printing enables you to produce complex shapes using less material than traditional manufacturing methods.



Some authors have claimed that 3D printers offer an unprecedented "revolution" in STEM education. The evidence for such claims comes from both the low cost ability for rapid prototyping in the classroom by students, but also the fabrication of low-cost high-quality scientific equipment from open hardware designs forming open-source labs. Engineering and design principles are explored as well as architectural planning. Students can recreate duplicates of museum items such as fossils and historical artifacts for study in the classroom without possibly damaging sensitive collections.¹ Other students interested in graphic designing can construct models with complex working parts easily. 3D printing gives students a new perspective with topographic maps. Entrepreneurs can create a prototype of their product for finance and "Pitch" presentations. Computer Science students will use their coding expertise to create a gamut of products and artifacts.

We are so excited to be adding this new technology to the department and can't wait to start producing.



Combine stock, tomatoes, celery, onions, pepper, parsley, and garlic. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and cover. Simmer for 20 minutes. Add corn, carrots, green beans, and peas. Cover and simmer for 15 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Heat to 165 degrees. Portion with a 8 oz scoop. Provides 50 servings.
