Administrator's Letter

From the Desk of District Administrator, Timothy L. Raymond Commitment to School & Community

As a young child, I can remember our Mother would take myself and my brothers to the cemetery in her hometown located in northern Ohio. You can imagine the conflict of wanting to get back to the car as quick as possible as these excursions always took place on the nicest days of summer. Ten year old boys are not made for visiting cemeteries let alone on warm summer days when swimming pools or local ponds to fish lie in wait. That urge conflicted with a level of respect that had to be maintained. It wasn't a solemn event, we walked through the cemetery passing various gravestones, where Mom would discuss this family and that family, who they were, and whether or not they had kin still living in town. I would be quickly reminded there was a need to resist the urge of youth and be mindful of what she was sharing.

Eventually, we would make our way to the markers of her great-grandparents, grandparents, and her own parents. She'd always reflect with the comment you can learn a lot about a community by visiting its local cemetery. Names of families that first settled an area appeared on the oldest of grave markers while newer ones adorned the same family name, only a hundred and fifty years later. Looking back on those visits I realize now what she was doing. Though I had lived in that town for a small time through my preschool years, that town was somehow part of who I was and who I was becoming. There was a reason why she'd park on the far end of the cemetery making us walk a distance farther than necessary. I learned more about Fremont, Ohio in those visits than any wikipedia or facebook page could ever teach me. It was through those moments that I also realized that some people end their time on earth only miles away from where they began life. Sometimes those two events happened in the same home. I share this only because it's with that understanding that I realized what community really means and what it's about. In this world some of us travel from place to place, with roots only a couple inches down into the ground, while others have a system that extends deep into the soil often intertwining with the roots of other trees. We know when the summer storms hit, it's these systems that keep the large oak or maple from falling over. The deeper, thicker, and more intertwined the roots, the greater the storm that it'll take to topple that tree.

Traveling the various villages and municipalities of the Cambria-Friesland school district, I've learned a couple of things. Everyone sees the world, our community, and school with different lenses. Some perspectives are more cynical than others and some much more positive. But the one thing that holds us together are those roots that were imbedded into the earth long ago. I've also learned there are people who are willing to give of themselves to ensure the roots of the tree remain strong and capable of withstanding any storm. Those are the people we need to attach our plows to and move forward. Finally, the thought that resonates most with me...my Mom was a very wise woman.

SUMMER BRIDGE

While the weather hasn't felt much like summer, the days are long and much is happening. Summer is the perfect time for students to try new experiences, like immersing themselves in a foreign country. This summer, several students participated in the Spanish trip to Panama and we know that they will bring back experiences and memories that will last a lifetime.

During the summer, the district will also receive the results from all of the state testing that was conducted. This is an important time for us to review the areas where we are seeing improvement and the areas that we need to focus on when school starts again in the Fall.

Some changes we already know will be occurring as certain needs have already been identified. One of the main areas where you may see some changes in the Fall is with our middle school schedule.

Over the past three years, the district has continually assessed how we were meeting the academic needs of our middle school students in key areas like math and reading. The focus began with targeting the reading area and strengthening the curriculum in language arts. We were seeing the results of a couple years where middle school was limited to a single language arts class. So, we returned to a system with both reading and language arts.





Our next task was addressing the needs in math. A new curriculum was adopted and teachers received training regarding updated methods of instruction that emphasize and support depth of understanding rather than rote formula work. This has been impactful but often students often need more time to process and understand things in this way.

So, in the Fall, middle school students will have modified schedules that allow for 70 minute periods for both math and language arts. Other courses will remain the same length as in the past - approximately 48 minutes. The middle school years are critical for solidifying student skills in these two key areas, so those periods have been extended. Instead of 1 shorter language arts period, 1 reading period and 1 math period. The time will be split evenly between math and language arts. Teachers will be able to make writing and English assignments match and relate to their reading assignments. Students will have more time for supported practice with math teachers in the classroom.

As always, we continue to assess what our student needs are and make changes to hopefully improve their learning experiences. We are looking forward to this continued development.

Preparing Students for Careers and College Readiness

As students move from elementary to middle school and from middle school to high school, we tend to focus on academic grades as well as standardized testing scores. While these are indicators of academic growth, we also want our students to develop life skills such as the ability to communicate and interact with others, plan their time appropriately, engage in decision making and problem solving, complete work tasks etc. Behavioral development, attendance, resiliency, attitude, and communication all factor into indicators of success in school and beyond.

The life skills students learn and develop along their academic journey help students to become career and college ready, and these skills that help prepare students for life are sometimes referred to as "soft" skills or "employability skills."

At the top of the list of employability skills is communication and teamwork. Teaching students to verbally communicate or correspond with teachers through email is important. The majority of employers use email accounts and expect to be updated and informed as projects are on track or if barriers exist to project completion.

Working in a team requires communication. Using an acceptable tone and body language, paying attention to what others are saying and listening before responding, taking notes when needed, and offering creative solutions and feedback all help to be a valuable team member. Developing these skills is an important aspect of students' growth.

After 3 years of collaboration as part of the Teacher Research Corps regarding math curriculum and instructional methods, she and her co-researcher brought the power of student self-reflection to the national stage.

Back in Wisconsin, Ms. Bell presented at the Wisconsin Mathematics Council annual conference in Green Lake. In an informative and enlightening application of the growth mindset, Ms. Bell spoke about the importance of making mistakes and how student understanding deepens when we focus on "Making Mistakes Matter."





Finally, this August Ms. Bell has been invited to participate in the Academy of Best Practices for CPM (College Preparatory Math) in Seattle where she will work with other veteran math teachers to look carefully at the impact of teacher questioning, the effective use of educational technology, and the latest research and understanding regarding instructional practices in math.

Because of her leadership in this area, Ms. Bell has been awarded grants and other financing sources to ensure she is able to participate. We look forward to the benefits our students will experience not only from what Ms. Bell brings back to the district for her own classroom but for our math department as a whole.

Take a Second Look at Summer School

Summer school, it's often thought of as credit recovery classes, ways to pass a class, or maybe just a way to fill time and lower daycare costs. It doesn't have to be that way though. At Cambria-Friesland, summer school is a positive word, meaning fun classes doing fishing, football, painting, basketball, cooking, learning about Pre-K, 5-K, or first grade, or maybe Mr. Johnson's writing class.

The summer school experience provides a more relaxed atmosphere with more one on one time with the teacher. Students have more time to do enjoyable, fun activities, and not worksheets, and waiting on teachers to do attendance, and yell at Jimmy biting John in the corner.

In the 2018 summer school year, I chose to take one class, Mr. Johnson's write to get published. We wrote articles to multiple publishers, and sent letters to businesses. I sent a letter to Horicon's Advanced Disposal- Glacier Ridge landfill.

About two months later, I received an email from Mr. Lonn Walter, the General Manager of the location. He invited me to the site for a tour and lunch.

On Monday, July twenty-third, me and my mom arrived at the location. I was given a Advanced Disposal pull over hi-vis shirt. I was shown the offices and scale. We then moved to the maintenance bays. They only have three bays, but because of their daily preventative maintenance done by drivers, they rarely run out of room. Mr. Walter then showed me the onsite recycling transfer point. The recycling is dumped in a shed, and then loaded into large semi trailers by a wheel loader.

We then walked to the truck yard, which was empty at the time, and holds over 150 trucks. Most are green ex-Veolia's some gray Advanced's and five red Badger Disposals, from the Badger buyout. We went in a yard pickup to the landfill where four-thousand tons are disposed of daily. The landfill also has a state-of-the-art gas and wastewater collection system that pulls more air through then needed, preventing any noticeable smell except for the working face. (Where the garbage is dumped and spread out.) While in the landfill, we seen the Beaver Dam driver dump his second load of the day. He is the most productive driver they have, dumping three times a day, and picking up 1,500 plus carts. We then had lunch delivered from Leroy's meats. Leroy's meat delivers all of there meetings meals. I was then given the last Advanced christmas gift they had left, sent from Florida headquarters. The truck was fully made of wood, and had my name engraved in it.

Unfortunately, this April, I learned that Advanced Disposal has a pending merger with Waste Management and will be closing it in 2019, and no longer existing as of January 1st, 2020. While most people may not be interested in the solid waste industry and are probably bored out of there mind by now, I feel like you can get the same results as me in any other summer school class you take. Especially Mr. Johnsons...

My Grandfather's Special Club

My grandfather belongs to a special club, but sadly the club is getting smaller everyday. This is because he is a World War II veteran and these special people are getting older and we have very few left. These people make up what is called the "Greatest Generation" because they sacrificed so much to make the world a better and safer place for us all. My grandfather is ninety-seven years old, and going strong, but I thought I would try to tell a little of his story because no one lives forever. The story of these soldiers however, should live forever.

The following is the story of Donovan McQueen, my grandfather. He was born near Columbus, Wisconsin in 1922. He decided to go to war in November of 1943 at 21 years old, and served for three years. He was a volunteer, he told me he volunteered because all his friends went to war, and he wanted to do his part and serve in the war.

Before he started training, Donovan caught pneumonia, nearly died and spent a week in a coma. Thankfully, penicillin was available and saved his life.

After training, on the way to Saipan, Japan, my grandfather and others stopped near a pineapple field for two weeks. With no further orders, they were stuck there.

Every day, my grandfather and his friends would go out into the fields and would eat pineapples until their tongues would burn.

Once on Saipan, my grandpa worked on the engines of B-29s, which is the type of plane that dropped the A-bomb on Japan.

In his free time, my grandfather said he liked to goof around with his friends, he told me he didn't remember much about what they did, or even who his friends were, but he did remember Tade. Tade always liked to pull pranks on others no matter what was happening, and would sometimes be found wearing dresses. It seems like no matter what was happening, or where you looked, there would always be Tade. Tade served a valuable purpose, he provided some laughs when humor was desperately needed.

The one thing, my grandfather remembers most, is a fly-by shooting from the Japanese. The Japanese opened fire of the B-29s, not aiming for anyone, only the planes. This was unusual and terrifying for him.

Throughout the war, my grandfather says he was never fully feared for his safety. He hasn't had any feeling of regret, pain, or sorrow. He knows that he was there for the right reasons and had a job to do which he proudly did.

"I took advantage of the end of the war," Donovan told me, "to get a degree in engineering." The G.I. Bill was a big help to him. It has an important role to all veterans and their families' education. This just shows that war doesn't always have a bad ending for everyone.

Even though some people never saw combat, they all played some of the most important parts in the war. Every person has an important part in the special club, and it wouldn't be a club without them. I am very proud of my grandfather and all our veterans who served in any war for our freedom.




